Dancing Times, 1910–1951

Dancing Times is the longest-running and most important dance periodical in Britain. It forms a unique chronicle of 20th-century classical and non-classical dance. Interviews with, and reviews and articles on, performers, choreographers, composers, designers and performances in London, Paris, Moscow, New York and elsewhere

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have been regular features of the journal since its inception. This edition includes annual indexes which appeared up to 1964.

Drury Lane Under Sheridan, 1776-1812

This publication offers a unique sequence of 130 plays submitted to Richard Brisley Sheridan during his years of proprietorship at the Theatre Royal, Drury Lane, from 1776-1812. The collection reveals both the general standard of work submitted to the nation's leading theater and the means by which it was adapted for performance.

English Stage after the Restoration, 1733-1822

Presented in two parts, the collection contains volumes from the British Library's Additional Manuscripts, and is devoted to the accounts and ledgers of Covent Garden during the period from the late 1780s to 1849, with supporting material related to the Drury Lane Company (eight volumes) in 1733-1735 at the Little Theatre in the Haymarket and in 1787-1802, during R.B. Sheridan's proprietorship, at Drury Lane. Also included are volumes from the Egerton Manuscripts, concentrating on Covent Garden, with a core of 53 volumes of further accounts and ledgers for the period 1736-1822.

Film Daily & Film Daily Yearbook: The Complete Collection, 1915-1970

PREVIOUS TITLE: *Major Film Periodicals for Media Research*

Series 1: Film Daily and Predecessors, 1915-1970

For 55 years *Film Daily* was the newspaper of the film and, later, the television industries. It provided trade news, details of films launched, films in progress, industry takeovers, financial crises, budget difficulties, company liquidations and court cases. Cinema historians can use this collection to study the backlash from the Hays Committee, the League of Decency, the Dies Committee and other censorship bodies. News of distribution arrangements, the American public's response to films, release schedules, cinematographers, film composers, musicians, set designers, producers, actors and directors provide an in-depth view of "The Dream Machine" in action.

Taken together, this complete set tracks the growth of the industry and is useful to any study of the motion picture business. Each annual volume lists the year's personalities and film releases, and provides an annual financial summary. Each yearbook provides a summary of the state of the industry through features, editorials, advertising and indexing. Actors, agents, directors, distributors, producers, publications, studios, writers and more are listed. The Yearbook provides an index to *Film Daily*

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and supplies details of the paper's own awards, as well as those of the film and television industries.

Gallup Looks at the Movies: Audience Research Report, 1940-1953

Audience Research Inc., a Gallup Poll affiliate directed by David Ogilvy, was commissioned by David O. Seiznick and other Hollywood producers to furnish data that would objectively record what the public wanted to see in the movies. Among the topics covered in the reports are star popularity, movie advertising and publicity, movie titles, pairing of leading men and women, and 3-D and wide screen formats.

History of Cinema

Series 1, Hollywood and the Product Code Administration

The Motion Picture Association of America (MPAA) Production Code Administration Files collection documents forty years of self-regulation and censorship in the motion picture industry. The collection contains detailed case files for nearly twenty thousand film projects that were submitted to the Production Code staff for consideration. These files span the years 1927 to 1968, and are arranged in chronological order by year of release. The selection includes films from every studio and genre, as well as examples of important foreign productions and independently made films. The core of the files is the correspondence between the studios or producers and the staffs of the PCA and the MPAA. Also included are confidential reports from state and national censor boards, copies of

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the official Production Code certificate letter, analysis sheets, song lyrics, wardrobe photographs, and articles and reviews from newspapers, magazines, and trade publications. The files are also filled with letters to and from theater owners, censor boards, religious organizations, government entities, and other special interest groups that were concerned with the content of motion pictures. In addition, the PCA files include such interoffice communications as telegrams, memoranda, and meeting notes. Many of the files also include other types of literary materials, such as stories, synopses, readers' reports, and treatments.

J. Edgar Hoover and Radicalism in Hollywood, Series 1: Communist Infiltration of the Movie Industry

J. Edgar Hoover's familiarity with the movie industry as well as his long-standing, almost indiscriminate, distrust of anyone holding Leftist political views led him in August 1942 to request the Los Angeles office of the bureau to report on "Communist Infiltration of the Motion Picture Industry." This publication includes reporting from informers, including president of the Screen Actors' Guild Ronald Reagan; files naming hundreds of influential writers, actors, directors, producers, union leaders, and studio executives; FBI "reviews" of main stream films it believed communist writers, directors, and actors successfully inserted communist propaganda into. In addition, the FBI investigations chronicle the working of major studios such as Paramount, RKO, and Warner Brothers, and the power struggles between the studios and studio

management and labor unions. Files also document FBI support of anti-Communist organizations.

Prompt Books of the English and American Stage, 1608-1926

PREVIOUS TITLE: *Drama on the World Stage*

This collection of non-Shakespearean prompt books cover a broad range of plays from many periods and by a great number of writers, from contemporary copies of Jacobean works to the plays of Ibsen and Boucicault.

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Records of the Free Southern Theater, 1963-1978

Established in 1963, the Free Southern Theatre (FST) served as a cultural and educational extension of the Civil Rights Movement. While offering entertainment and opportunities for artistic expression, the FST endeavored to use black drama to develop and enhance racial awareness.

The majority of plays were written, produced, directed, and performed by black artists. The home base for the theater was originally Jackson, Mississippi, but moved to New Orleans after 1965.

The productions of the Free Southern Theater included plays that had been Broadway productions as well as unpublished scripts, many of which were written by members of the FST company. Among the records of the theater are more than two hundred original scripts, many which were written by members of the FST company.

The records of the Free Southern Theatre describe the accomplishments of the company, its failures, and its constant struggle to find the funds needed to carry out its programs. The archives include correspondence files, personnel files, financial records (including records of fund raising activities) and documentation (scripts, casting, publicity, attendance records, and reviews).

PREVIOUS TITLE: *Records of the Great Playhouses*

From the archives of these two influential British theaters, researchers can trace the artistic and social history of the theater.

This part of the collection documents the rise of Grimaldi, the heyday of popular classical theater under Samuel Phelps in the 1840s and Sadler's Wells' evolution as a major venue for opera and dance.

Russian State Archive of Literature and Art (RGALI)

Association of Workers of Revolutionary Cinematography

Led by prominent filmmakers, the Association aimed to maintain ideological control over the making of films. The organization set up branches in film studios, published periodicals, promoted proletarian ideology in films and confronted technical challenges. This impressive collection includes correspondence, meeting notes, memoranda and periodicals.

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Meyerhold Theater, 1920–1938

This collection contains materials from one of the most influential theater producers and directors of the 20th century, Vsevolod Meyerhold. As head of theatrical activities for the new regime, Meyerhold was the first to specialize in Soviet plays and was among the earliest advocates of the “theater of the absurd.”

Mosfilm, 1938–1945

The largest and most prestigious studio during this era, Mosfilm produced some of the landmarks in Russian cinema. The Mosfilm archive gives unique insight into the Stalinist concept of “Socialist Realism” in Russia, whereby “artists” would only produce and perform in accordance with socialist thinking, and in turn, become an integral part of the propaganda machine.

Viennese Theatre, 1740–1790

PREVIOUS TITLE: *German and Austrian Drama*

This collection contains approximately 2,500 items forming a valuable record of the development of the Viennese theater. The major portion of this collection is composed of titles from Viennese dealer Michael Krieg and bound in the late 18th century in 385 tract volumes that were part of an Austrian Schlossbibliothek. Harvard has incorporated about 500 additional works into the Krieg collection and these are also included on the microfilm.

Warner Brothers Screenplays, 1930–1950

PREVIOUS TITLE: *Wisconsin/Warner Brothers Screenplay, 1930-1950*

This collection gives cinema scholars an opportunity to study the final shooting scripts for several genres of Warner productions during Hollywood’s golden age. As primary source documents for the cinema scholar, screenplays are distinct from the published film script, which is a transcription of a completed picture. Includes gangster films, women’s films, social dramas, the musical and crime films; horror, detective, murder-melodrama, war films, westerns, comedy and prestige pictures.
